

Meet Visiting Minister for August, Rev. Marcia Hoffman!



Rev. Hoffman will be joining us Sunday, August 28th as she leads our Sunday Service,

"Contemplations About Peace: Order-Disorder-Reorder,"

Read her bio below and plan to stay after service on the 28th and get to know her with conversation and refreshments.

Marcia Hoffman is a native Southern Californian, living there all of her life. She now resides in the Pasadena area (Rose Bowl-Rose parade fame). Since the age of 9 she was always active in church life, volunteering in the areas of music and education of children as she got older. During her college years she was Director of Music at a Methodist Church while she worked on her BS degree in music and drama, and completed her course work, including the fifth year requirement for her California teaching credential.

After teaching and beginning her family, and discussing her call with her husband, John, she entered Claremont School of Theology and earned her Master's of Divinity degree. Before her graduation, she received her first call to Manhattan Beach Community Church, United Church of Christ. Upon her ordination she was granted ordained standing with both United Church of Christ and the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), since she had been in care with both denominations during seminary. She served in her last years before retirement at San Marino Congregational Church, United Church of Christ. She has been a delegate from California for both denominations at a gathering of churches from multiple countries that was held in Taiwan several years ago, has also been part of a delegation that traveled to Independent Samoa and American Samoa a few years ago, continues to serve for both denominations on the Ecumenical and Interfaith committee for the UCC conference and DOC region, and works part time by assisting pastors with preaching, teaching and pastoral visitation, and sometimes with church music. In 2010, Marcia's husband, John, died suddenly from a brain aneurism. Her California family includes son Bradley Hoffman and his son Taylor, son Vince and Emily Hoffman and their daughter Julia, and Whitefish family daughter Francine and Dave Bottinelli, and their son Moss. That, of course, brings Marcia frequently to Montana!
